

Guiding Your Beta Reader

In order to make the most of your beta reader's feedback, it's often best if you guide their attention to the most problematic aspects of your novel - the areas you're most concerned with.

The questions below offer a starting point. What area of your novel needs the most work? Have a look, and use some of our prompts to kickstart your beta reader's critique.

The Opening:

- Does the manuscript begin in the right place?
- Is there a sufficient hook to convince the reader to keep reading?
- Are the protagonist's motives made clear?
- Is the setting made clear?
- Are enough questions raised?
- Does everything make logical sense?

The Characters:

- Is there a character the reader can relate to?
- Are the protagonist's motivations clear and believeable?
- Is there sufficient backstory to make the characters well-rounded?
- Is the setting made clear?
- Are the stakes high enough? What do the characters have to lose and gain?
- Are the character relationships authentic?
- Are there any unnecessary characters?

The Plot:

- Are there any gaping plot holes?
- Are the stakes high enough to keep the reader invested?
- Are the plot twists free of cliche, yet still unexpected?
- Are the plot points and conflict in the right places?
- Do the scenes progress naturally?
- Are there any unnecessary scenes or chapters?
- Were there any sections where the reader gets bored?
- Does each chapter end with a hook for the next?
- Are there any sections of 'info dumping' or unnecessary description?

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The Setting:

- Are the settings in the novel clear?
- Are the settings adequately described?
- Do the settings make logical sense in relation to one another and the context of the novel?
- Is there always a clear sense of place and time in each scene?
- Do the details of the setting add to the narrative?
- Is there an aspect of the setting that needs improvement?

The Subplot(s):

- Is enough time spent developing the subplot(s)
- Do they add to the main plot or detract from it?
- Does the subplot work logically where it's been placed in the manuscript?
- Are there any contradictions between the plot and subplots?
- Do the scenes progress naturally?
- Can anything be done to make the subplots more intriguing?
- Were there any sections where the reader gets bored?

The Writing + General Reading Experience:

- Is the voice fresh and consistent throughout the manuscript?
- Is the voice appropriate for the intended target audience?
- Is the writing engaging?
- Are there any literary techniques used that don't work in the novel?
- Did you enjoy reading this book? Why? Why not?
- Who's your favourite character and why?
- Who's your least favourite character and why?
- Were there any sections in the manuscript that were confusing or out of place?
- What was your favourite moment in the book, and why?
- What was your least favourite moment in the book, and why?

Don't forget to ask your beta reader for their overall first impressions of the book!

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
